Archbishop Colin Johnson of the Diocese of Toronto invites you to be a part of Shalom Justice Camp by taking part in this unique justice and advocacy experience. You will experience justice issues by working hands-on as you journey together with other campers.

Who can attend the Camp?

Justice Camp is open to anyone 16 and over. Although the Anglican Diocese of Toronto hosts the camp, people of any denomination who are interested in uncovering and understanding the justice issues that exist in our society are welcome to attend.

What is Justice Camp?

Justice Camp brings together people of all ages from across Canada to live and learn together for six days. Justice Camp will help participants learn how to actively serve communities through church outreach. The goal is to develop justice leadership in the Anglican Church of Canada and in other denominations.

Justice Camp is all about active learning through immersion experiences with local justice partners and guided reflection time with small group facilitators. At least 50 percent of the participants will be young adults (16 to 35). People from across Canada will be taking part.



Goals of the Camp:

- considering the concepts of charity vs. justice, their strengths and limitations as they relate to parish outreach
- discerning and interpreting local needs in a way that leads to action
- learning techniques for grassroots organizing and developing a justice-oriented approach to outreach
- striving to be prophetic
- sharing best practices for community building, advocating and lobbying on the many issues of social justice we find in our world
- enabling individuals and communities of faith to be agents of transformation and reconciliation.



Camp Schedule

Day 1 and 2 - Introduction:

Community Building, Biblical Foundations, Education and Advocacy Skills

Day 3 to 5 - Small Immersion Groups:

Hands-on experience exploring community development with reference to a specific issue
